9. Guest speaker – Tony Stevenson – grades 7-12

Peter Anthony "Tony" Stevenson Speaker from the Office of the Treaty Commissioner


Peter A. "Tony" Stevenson is a Saulteaux First Nation from the Cote Reserve. Playing competitive hockey and fastball has allowed Mr. Stevenson to travel throughout the provinces. "Tony", as he is commonly known as, had attended the Qu Appelle Indian Residential School at Lebret, Saskatchewan from grade 5-12.




Tony's experience and background is extensive as he has worked in many different areas of the human relations field. He has received recognition from Saskatchewan Abex Awards and Regina Chamber of Commerce for creating jobs within the banking industry. Working with Sheldon Kennedy in creating awareness of the cycle of abuse in First Nations Communities was recognized by an Abuse Awareness Organization in Ontario, they awarded Tony the Queens Diamond Jubilee Medal.

Tony's most notable creation was the QIRS.com website and then his tenure with the law firms wherein he worked specifically on the IAP process. The law firms recruited Tony for his abilities, as he points out, "I did not ask for a job, nor, did I send in my resume, they asked to meet me." Taking pride in working with his peers and Elders from all over Canada in this process has given Tony the ability to advocate for the residential school survivors.

"As a young boy, I remember seeing the dependency of drugs, alcohol, and this cycle of abuse. I lived on a reserve that had the highest suicide rate in Canada. Thirty-five years has past and the sad part is nothing has really changed. This day and age there are other reserves in Canada that takes a turn in holding that unfortunate distinction. I have lost many "Brothers and Sisters" from this legacy. I sincerely feel this as a part of my legacy to educate, create an awareness to both the Non-First Nations and First Nations people of this generation. Having the opportunity to prepare the adjudication files and self-represent myself in my own hearing, I understand the mindset of those who still suffer from this failed experiment. Through stories, visual presentations, and the creation of meaningful dialogue are my tools. I see this as an Honour and Privilege to advocate for the most vulnerable, my People."
