The following are student reflections from Tony Stevenson presentation on residential schools.

"I agree that there is no amount of money can that repair the harm that was done to people in residential schools." (Grade 9)

"Very touching. There was a strong message that we are not to disrespect other people or their cultures. Hearing other stories helps us all to learn." (Grade 12)

"The video was so powerful. It exposed stereotypes. The honesty was pure." (grade 11)

"I was blown away that the last Residential School only closed in Saskatchewan in 1998. That is very sad." (grade 10)

"Tony Stevenson is a very real speaker of the truth of his people and how he feels. There is nothing sugar-coated about his message. It sticks with you. It hits you deeply because he speaks of real people who have experienced trauma and a loss of their culture." (Grade 11)

"This presentation will give all of us the confidence to stand up when we hear someone saying something wrong." (Grade 12)

"The presentation was incredibly solemn. I could feel the discrimination. There is so much pain behind the entire culture. It was very eye-opening." (Grade 11)

"It is hurtful to know that this was the reality for my relatives." (Grade 11)

"Hearing a survivor vs hearing a history teacher talk about this topic was powerful. He talked about real truths about the people he knew." (grade 12)

"The strongest message I took away is that we are learning for the future. We must never make these mistakes again." (grade 12)
